Command:

The command of the EATC rotates between France and Germany. The current commander is German Major General (OF-7) Christian Badia. The deputy commander and chief of staff is French Brigadier General (OF-6) Pascal Chiffoleau.

EATC Structure:

The command group is supported by 3 divisions: the operational division, the functional division and the policy & support division.

Missions:

- Optimize the employment of AT assets
- Command & control transfered AT assets
- Harmonize rules & regulations for future common operations (interoperability)

European Air Transport Command

EATC is a multinational command established on 1^{st} September 2010. It is located at Eindhoven air base in the Netherlands and integrates a staff of 200 people coming from the seven member nations.

Today EATC is a unique organisation within Europe for military air transport (AT), air-toair refuelling (AAR) and aeromedical evacuation (AE). It successfully pools and shares air capabilities, develops into a centre of expertise in AT and training & exercise domains and aims to become a centre of excellence in AAR related matters.

What does EATC do for our nations?

EATC commands a large and diverse air transport fleet.

Each member nation has access not only to its nationally assigned military assets but to the complete EATC multinational fleet. This fleets represents more than 60% of all military AT assets in Europe and more than 20 different types of aircraft.

EATC chooses at any time the asset which fits best the requirements of a mission.

The diversity of this multinational fleet offers EATC a unique flexibility, as well as the opportunity to optimize missions and enhance the required efficiency and effectiveness.

EATC plans, tasks, controls and reports on missions on behalf of the nations.

This innovative concept is at the core for EATC's success offering its member nation a conditioned delegation of authority but also the assured availability of an asset.

EATC's member nations transfer authority to the Commander EATC over designated AT assets, but they can anytime revoke this transfer of authority. Moreover each nation can safeguard at any moment national caveats.

EATC is a facilitator to share values and concepts.

EATC fosters the harmonization of doctrines and procedures among nations in order to build up a toolbox to enable future common operations.

EATC is planning and executing international training events.


